Section I: Request

We are requesting to restructure the Division of Pediatric Immunology/Rheumatology in the Department Pediatrics by separating the division to establish two new subspecialty divisions. The new divisions will be 1) Allergy and Immunology, and 2) Pediatric Rheumatology. The missions of both divisions will be clinical practice advancement, education, investigation, administration/service and advocacy. The Division of Allergy and Immunology will focus its academic and clinical missions around allergic disorders, including eosinophilic diseases (such as eosinophilic esophagitis), reactive airway disease (asthma) and primary immune deficiency disorders. The Division of Allergy and Immunology will be a Division within the Department of Pediatrics.

Section II: Need

Within the last six years, the demand for our allergy/immunology services have grown substantially; the demand exceeds our current capacity. Due to this increased demand for clinical services and growth of the current division (Pediatric Immunology/Rheumatology), it has become an operational necessity to create two subspecialty divisions. Practitioners in the Intermountain region, and throughout the country, almost never practice both of these two subspecialties, and are only closely associated, if at all, through their practice groups. Allergy/Immunology and Rheumatology have a common scientific underpinning in immunology, but the nature of the disorders that are managed and studied are markedly different, and entail differing clinical processes. This is reflected in the separate boards for certification in the two subspecialties.

Section III: Institutional Impact

Although the Division of Allergy/Immunology provides clinical services for both pediatric and adult patients in the University of Utah Health Care System, the Division will be in the Department of Pediatrics and will utilize existing Department administrative resources. No new physical facilities, no modifications to existing facilities and no new equipment are required. Currently, we are recruiting additional clinical faculty for the Pediatric division as the demand for our services exceeds our capacity. Although no new facilities are needed for the proposed division, the providers plan to establish a Site of Service 11 clinic off site because of the lack of space in University Hospital clinics.

Section IV: Finances

There are no additional costs anticipated from this reorganization. The Division of Allergy/Immunology will continue to completely pay its costs through clinical revenue and extramural funding. Provision of high value ambulatory Allergy services will provide an essential contribution to the University's Clinically Integrated Network. Research funding in basic and clinical aspects of Allergy and Immunology, and support for clinical trials in new treatment modalities is likely to continue to be available from federal and industry sources, and is part of the overall strategy for developing a larger Allergy/Immunology presence at the University of Utah.

Section I: Request

We are requesting to restructure the Division of Pediatric Immunology/Rheumatology in the Department Pediatrics by separating the division to establish two new subspecialty divisions. The new divisions will be 1) Pediatric Rheumatology and 2) Allergy and Immunology. The missions of both divisions will be clinical practice advancement, education, investigation, administration/service and advocacy. The Division of Pediatric Rheumatology will have a clinical and academic mission centered on the diagnosis, treatment and understanding of autoimmune and autoinflammatory diseases in childhood and adolescents, particularly those that affect the musculoskeletal system, but also internal organ systems and blood elements. The Division of Pediatric Rheumatology will be a Division within the Department of Pediatrics.

Section II: Need

Within the last six years, the demand for our clinical services in rheumatology and in allergy/immunology have grown substantially. Due to this increased demand for clinical services and growth of the current division (Pediatric Immunology/Rheumatology), it has become an operational necessity to create two subspecialty divisions. Practitioners in the Intermountain region, and throughout the country, almost never practice both of these two subspecialties, and are only closely associated, if at all, through their practice groups. Rheumatology and Allergy/Immunology have a common scientific underpinning in immunology, but the nature of the disorders that are managed and studied are markedly different, and entail differing clinical processes. This is reflected in the separate boards for certification in the two subspecialties.

Section III: Institutional Impact

The Division of Pediatric Rheumatology will be in the Department of Pediatrics and will utilize existing Department administrative resources. No additional faculty or staff are required in the immediate future. No new physical facilities, no modifications to existing facilities and no new equipment are required. We have adequate Pediatric Rheumatologists on our faculty to serve the needs of the Wasatch Front and Intermountain Region, and enough faculty to provide training to trainees.

Section IV: Finances

There are no additional costs anticipated from this reorganization. At present, the proposed Division of Pediatric Rheumatology requires a subsidy from the Department of Pediatrics mainly to cover the costs of managing a chronic disease population which is not currently reimbursed well under fee-for-service. This subsidy will not increase with this reorganization, and is likely to decrease as prospective payment models and extramural funding grows in this area.
