

Dr. Murtaugh studied dietetics at Syracuse University and worked as a clinical dietitian. She then pursued her PhD in nutrition at the University of Connecticut before joining the faculty at Rush-Presbyterian St. Luke's Medical Center in the teacher-practitioner-researcher model for 8 years. At Rush, she conducted clinical studies surrounding nutrition for pregnant and breastfeeding women. She completed a Post-Doctoral fellowship in cardiovascular epidemiology at the University of Minnesota in order to begin her transition to nutrition epidemiology focused on chronic disease. Presently she is an Associate Professor in Epidemiology in the Department of Medicine with adjunct appointments in Nutrition and Integrative Physiology and Population Health Sciences. She is Director of Graduate studies for Population Health Sciences and co-director the KL2 internal career development program at the Utah CCTS. Her work includes the investigating the role of nutrition development of chronic diseases including systemic sclerosis and irritable bowel disease. She is author on 96 peer review publications. She has chaired or contributed to over 30 Masters' or Doctoral degree committees. She teaches the Grant Writing Course for the Masters Degree program in Clinical Investigation. Dr. Murtaugh has served in variety of professional service roles ranging from Chair of a National Practice Group, Board of Directors for a regional Diabetes Association, and the National Institute of Arthritis and Musculoskeletal Skin Diseases, National Multicultural Outreach Initiative, American Indian/Alaska Native/Native Hawaiian Work Group, the Utah Academy of Nutrition and Dietetics. Her Service at the University of Utah Service includes the Teaching Committee, and a Graduate School Internal Review Committee, Review Committee, Internal Department Review of Consumer and Family Studies, and both academic senate and academic senate executive committee. Dr. Murtaugh's administrative and research collaborations cross colleges and departments at the University of Utah and the VA. She will draw on her relationships across campus, her leadership, mentoring, clinical, research, and teaching experiences and perspectives to represent the faculty of the University of Utah.
