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To Whom It May Concern,

I am pleased and excited to provide my support for the Department of Communication emphases proposal and the opportunities this will provide our department in the future. Our faculty voted unanimously to support the creation of emphases in the undergraduate curriculum at our 2018-2019 Faculty Retreat.

First and foremost, the change from sequences to emphases will most influence and aid students in achieving their degree. An emphasis distinction on a student's transcript and diploma will signal to future employers of their focus and detailed instruction in that field. It will also provide students with a clear direction and structure as they complete their studies within the Department of Communication, giving them both broad and in-depth instruction.

Furthermore, the change to emphases will help the department and its advisors in data collection and bookkeeping. Advisors will be able to track students' progress and create schedules more easily. This will lead to better Degree Audit Reports for Students, ultimately leading them to a clearer degree path.

Science, Health, Environmental, and Risk Communication involves developing expertise about the ways in which these topics are discussed and communicated. This applies to professional communication among scientists and physicians, to public communication like media coverage and social marketing campaigns, and to interpersonal communication between doctors and patients. An emphasis in this area would allow students to have the transcripted distinction to make strong, bold moves in the job market. I believe this will not only benefit our students, but our department as a whole.
