University of Utah requests approval to offer the following : Master of City & Metropolitan Planning/Master of Public Administration Dual Degree effective Fall 2019. This program was approved by the institutional Board of Trustees on .

The University of Utah's College of Architecture + Planning and the Department of City & Metropolitan Planning, together with the College of Social & Behavioral Science request permission to establish a dual degree program that enables students to earn a Master of City & Metropolitan Planning (MCMP) degree and a Master of Public Administration (MPA) degree simultaneously. If approved, the dual degree program would be available beginning Fall Semester 2019.

This request is NOT to establish a new degree program. Instead, it seeks to take advantage of complementary intellectual benefits from studying city & metropolitan planning and public administration in a coordinated program. A student enrolled in the dual degree program will be able to earn both degrees in less time and with fewer overall credit requirements than if that student enrolled in each degree program independently. More importantly, the program will allow students to delve more deeply into the natural synergies that exist between the two disciplines.

Students seeking to take advantage of the MCMP/MPA program must meet current University of Utah admission standards and be accepted into both the MCMP and MPA programs. Upon enrollment, students in the dual degree program will complete the core courses in both regular degree programs, totaling 60 credit hours. This is 30 credit hours fewer than completing both programs sequentially. Students enrolled in the dual MCMP/MPA degree program can expect to complete the two degrees within five semesters if they maintain a full-time schedule of 12 credit hours per semester. Students enrolled in the dual degree program must complete all MCMP and all MPA requirements before either degree will be awarded.

Upon completion of both programs, students earn two separate degrees: an MCMP degree awarded by the College of Architecture + Planning and an MPA degree awarded by the College of Social & Behavioral Science.

The MPA faculty approved this proposal on January 10, 2019. The CMP faculty approved the proposal and received college approval at the College of Architecture College Council, January 9, 2019.

The rationale for this dual degree program is driven by student demand and facilitated by program synchronicity. In 2014, the Master of City & Metropolitan Planning program began offering a specialization in Small Town and Resort Town Planning (START), which sought to provide focused training for planners headed to careers in rural locations and small towns across the Intermountain West. Given the predominance of rural landscapes and small municipalities in Utah and other Western states, it made sense that the University of Utah should have a program focusing on those land forms and institutions. As part of that curriculum, the CMP program encouraged MCMP students to take courses in Public Administration, in particular those relating to municipal project management, administration, and finance.

In a similar fashion, the Master of Public Administration program has encouraged their students to take planning courses for some of their elective credits. Recently, we have seen a large number of MPA students registering for planning courses related to community engagement. One course in particular--CMP 6620: Negotiation and Dispute Resolution for Planners--has seen a recent surge of MPA students. In fact, this coming spring semester (2019), the MPA students will outnumber the planners.

The Bureau of Labor Statistics estimates a 12.8% growth in jobs for planners between 2016 and 2026, substantially higher than the national average increase in employment. Locally, that translates into more than 300 open positions annually across the Intermountain West. We anticipate that this will translate into greater student interest in acquiring the skills that will equip them for working in municipalities of a variety of sizes and contexts, including the small towns and rural areas covered in the START MCMP specialization. For a number of these students, the opportunity for dual credentialing in both planning and public administration will provide excellent opportunities.

The mission of the University of Utah is "to foster[] student success by preparing students from diverse backgrounds for lives of impact as leaders and citizens." This proposed dual MCMP/MPA degree is consistent with this mission as it prepares students for becoming leaders in community across Utah and the West. As there is currently no other accredited planning program in Utah (or seven other states in the northern Rocky Mountain/High Plains region), there is unlikely to be any impact on other USHE institutions from this dual degree program.

We do not anticipate more than minimal financial impacts as the result of this program, except for possible positive impacts from the marketing edge the dual degree program will provide our MCMP and MPA programs as we compete with other institutions (especially those in the PAC-12) for high-quality applicants. By providing an outlet for prospective students interested in both disciplines and signaling an alignment between the two programs, having the dual MCMP/MPA will assist our two programs in recruiting those prospective students.
