- * Two of the five required courses can be taken during the summer through one of the Department's five-week Learning Abroad Programs (for instance, French in Grenoble, Japanese in Osaka, German in Kiel, etc.)
- * At the end of the program students can (but are not obliged to) take the OPI test (= Oral Proficiency Interview), which is a nationally recognized test to assess the learner's speaking ability. It is anticipated that Certificate students will reach Level 3, demonstrating "Professional Working Proficiency." (Level 3 stipulates that the learner can "discuss topics extensively, support opinions, hypothesize. The proposed Language and Culture Certificate for Graduate Students is consistent with the University of Utah's mission to foster student success because it will expand the range of jobs open to graduate students. The program will not be delivered outside the University of Utah's designated service area because all courses will be taught on the University of Utah campus. An exception are those courses taught through the University of Utah's approved Learning Abroad programs.

There are neither new instructional costs nor savings associated with this Certificate since it draws entirely from existing courses. The only requirement is the creation of graduate sections in conjunction with existing undergraduate courses.

Learning Outcomes: It is anticipated that students who have completed the Graduate Language and Culture Certificate in French, German, Italian, Portuguese and Spanish will reach the Advanced Level according to the ACTFL (=American Council on the Teaching of Foreign Languages) guidelines.

In terms of linguistics proficiency, a learner at the Advanced Level can "narrate and describe in past, present, and future. Deal effectively with an unanticipated complication." In terms of cultural proficiency, the learner is able to explain in their "own and other cultures...some diversity among products and practices and how it relates to perspectives."

It is expected that students who have completed the Graduate Language and Culture Certificate in **Arabic, Chinese, Japanese, Korean, and Russian** will reach the **Intermediate Level** according to the ACTFL guidelines. In terms of linguistics proficiency, a learner at the intermediate level can "Create with language, initiate, explain and bring to a close simple conversations by asking and responding to simple questions." In terms of cultural proficiency, the learner is able to make in their "own and other cultures... comparisons between products and practices to help understand perspectives."

Dear Council Members:

I am writing to give my support for the Department of World Languages & Cultures to offer a Language and Cultural Certificate for Graduate Students to be effective Fall 2020. The purpose of this certificate is to give graduate students tangible proof of their foreign language and foreign cultural training. The certificate will be offered in the following languages: Arabic, Chinese, French, German, Italian, Japanese, Korean, Portuguese, Russian, and Spanish.

There are a number of benefits to the University of Utah and the State of Utah. First, students will be able to develop and demonstrate skills in other languages and cultures that will add value to the other areas that they are studying (e.g. business, health services, etc.). The Certificate will document foreign cultural and language skills when students' degrees are not in our language department, which will distinguish them on the job market and open up job opportunities. In addition, these certificates will support the global learning and intercultural competence that the University of Utah prizes. It will also offer further skills and training to those who plan on teaching in Utah.

As Utah is becoming more culturally diverse, employers value graduates who can work with various populations here and abroad. There are a number of private and public businesses, NGOs, including the LDS Church, who view foreign language and culture skills as an important asset in their employees. The only other university in Utah that offers a language certificate is BYU, and it is only for their own undergraduates. Thus, this Certificate will be a unique offering that sets the U of U apart in the state.

This proposed Certificate lines up with the institutional mission of the University of Utah in the following ways: fostering student success, generating and sharing new knowledge, engaging local and global communities, promoting education and quality of life, and acting as responsible stewards. There will be no new costs with this certificate because it draws on existing courses and teachers. There will only be a need to add graduate sections connected to already existing undergraduate language classes. The administrative burden will be shared by the Director of Graduate Studies in our department and the Graduate Advisor.

We believe that this Certificate will have a positive impact on graduate students, the University of Utah, and the State of Utah. It will promote the goal of a "University for Utah"—its citizens, communities, and businesses.
